



## Bureau of Land Management

In Colorado, the BLM manages 8.3 million acres of public lands, along with 27 million acres of mineral estate. Much of this land is concentrated in the western portion of the state. BLM lands in Colorado range from alpine tundra, colorful canyons and mesas, to rolling sage covered hills. These lands are managed for a multitude of uses, including: recreation, mining, wildlife habitat, and livestock grazing.

From the front range of the Rockies to the majestic vistas of the Gunnison Gorge and Black Ridge Canyons on the western slope, BLM Colorado offers a multitude of recreation opportunities. Each BLM Field Office offers recreation adventures ranging from hunting, hiking, mountain biking, off-highway vehicle use, camping, backpacking, fishing, nature study, photography, and picnicking. These adventures can take place within very accessible lands, with facilities or in remote lands with no facilities.

The BLM offers adventures in the wide open spaces of the Old West. Adventure seekers; including hunters, campers, and anglers; can still get to these lands in a single day and without crowds.
